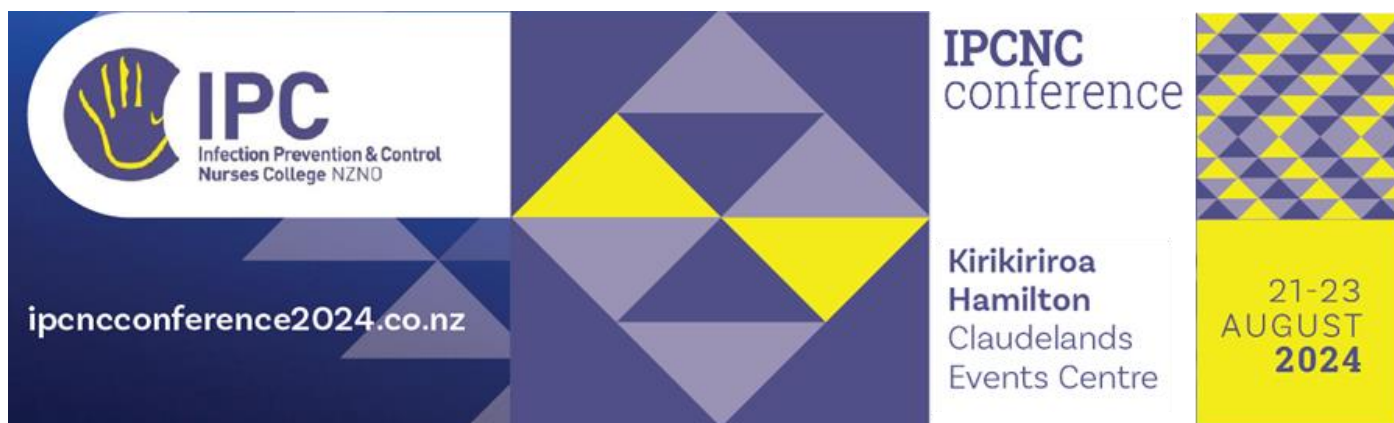

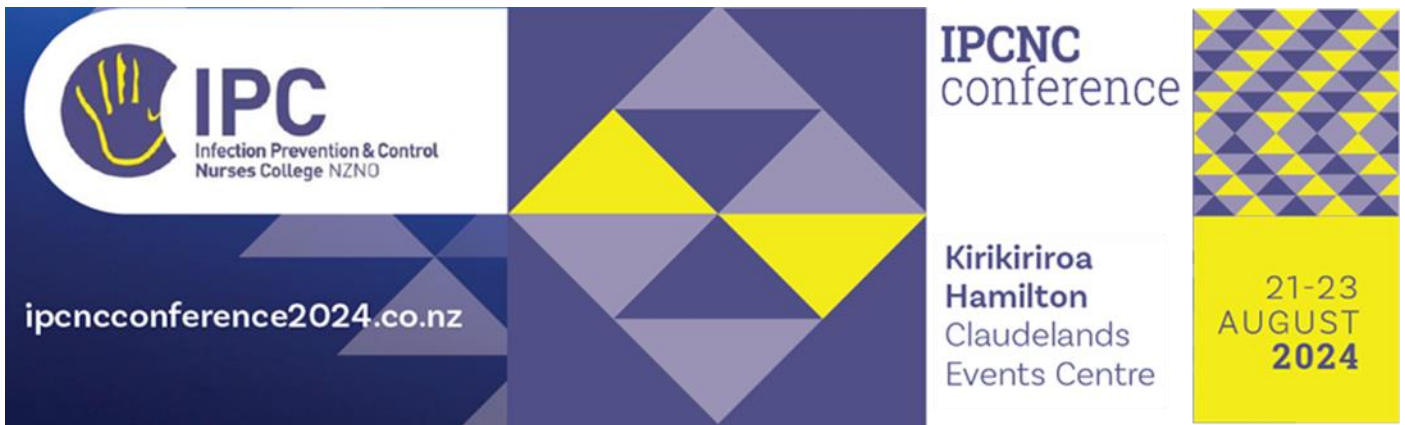

RN Sally Thompson from ICU wrote:

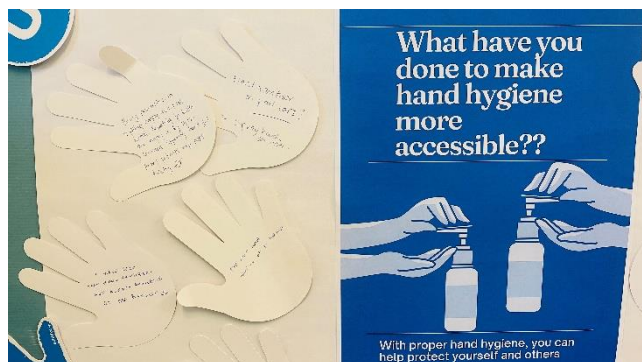

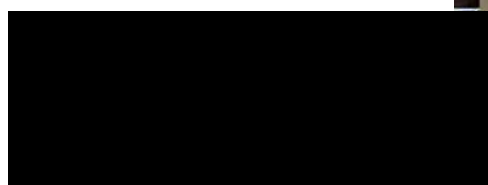

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Guidelines for the NZNO Infection Prevention and Control Nurses' College Members to access Webber Training Teleclass Education lectures
